Here's a story that has had little if any Airborne press. When Lt. Dick Alzman jumped into Normandy he landed at the edge of an apple orchard getting stuck in one of the trees near the farm's barn. Then he started struggling with the harness like many troopers did upon landing. High adrenalin, fear, mission urgency where all reason to shed the parachute quickly and the buckles were not friendly. The lieutenant only got one shoulder off before electing to cut his one strap with his knife to lose the assembly, a common jester. Then he went on to join the war.

40 years after the D-day invasion Dick and wife Betty returned. Like many other couples Dick and wife Betty were staying with a French family. When man of the house, Eugene Tirel, asked him, Dick was pleased to recount to his guest about his adventures in those first few days of Normandy.

"Would you like to see your landing site?" The host asked.

"Sure, but I'd never be able to find it." Dick responded.

His French guest had a hunch however and drove Dick to a local farm outside Chef-du-Pont to meet the 47-year-old owner. Once there the farmer was encouraged to share a story he had witnessed 40 years ago.

This farmer retold of hearing all the noise and rushing outside with his little brother. They watched the planes and a trooper who landed next to the barn and fought with his parachute for awhile before taking his knife and

cutting himself out. The trooper then ran to the hedgerow, tried climbing over, fell down, tried again and made it.

"That's right, I did fall down," said Dick who had completely forgotten that part.

So the farmer then showed Dick where he had landed although the tree had blown down a few years before. The hedgerow he had climbed was still intact and Dick was thrilled to find the location.

After sharing this information the farmer asked Dick to stay put while he went inside his barn. When he came out he was carrying a vintage WWII parachute harness with one strap cut out.

"I sorry but we used up the silk material for household use." And the farmer gave Dick back his harness.

No apology needed thought Dick. When he left Normandy to return to the states he carried home a rather odd but amazing souvenir.

Dear Sir:

This is in response to the information sent to you by my son William Blaine Scudder, Jr. I was born on February 7th 1944 and my father was killed in action on Hill 131 in Normandy, France and buried originally in Blossville, France.

To date, I have received most of the medals and awards that he was due including his Bronze Star along with many more. I am sending all of the information concerning his Silver Star including the news release explaining what he did and that a news photographer accompanied them on this mission that he led a group of volunteers to retrieve two officers and two enlisted men that were wounded. I am sending this information along with letters from Sgt. Wayne M. Faxon that had writted to my Aunt Bernice Scudder explaining in great detail what he did and that he knew he was going on a suicide mission. He shook hands with my Father one hour before he was killed to U. S. Senator John McCain.

After numerous request of the National Personnel Records center in St. Louis, only to receive virtually no information from them. I also have his IDPF file. I contacted U.S. Senator John McCain, who was an Air Force jet fighter pilot shot down in North Viet Nam along with a cousin of mine Bobby Lilley that was also an Air Force jet fighter pilot shot don over North Viet Nam and the two were roommates in a POW camp for 5 years. Senator McCain is also the Chairman of The Armed Forces Committee and been instrumental in getting me all of me medals and awards the my Father was due. There are several more that will come in due time.

In addition to having all of his patches and emblems and one of his dog tags, I also have record that my father made and sent it to my Mother. It was postmarked December 24, 1943. This was prior to them boarding the ship to Ireland, I have been unable to play it due to lack of a record player that plays a 78 rpm record. I plan on taking this to a recording studio and having a cd made of it. I also have

three or four scrap books that my mother had saved about their life together. All of this has been in my Father original footlocker that was sent to my Mother from France.

Frank served his country from 1940 - 1943 at Jefferson Barracks, St. Louis where he was attached to the medics, repairing wheelchairs and as a general handyman. In 1943 Frank volunteered to become a paratrooper. In the ensuing months of intense training and combat he had occasion to question his judgment. On D-Day Frank jumped with his unit and landed in enemy-held territory near Picauville, where he spent the first two hours alone looking for buddies. He was part of the Shanley's force on Hill 30. Staples was a bazooka man in Normandy. He was part of the unit that took out the bicycle patrol at Baupthe, (he said there were less than a dozen Germans) On July 4, 1944 he fought at Hill 95 where he received a minor shrapnel wound and earned a Purple Heart.

Pfc Staples jumped again in Holland and was trucked into Belgium for the Battle of The Bulge.

Frank never let anyone forget that when a soldier needed 85 points for discharge, he had 105 and was one of the first of his unit released to return home.

Memorial services for Frank were held May 26, 2007 at the First Baptist Church of Grand Marais. A private interment was held with his family present. Cremation services were provided by the Cremation Society of Minnesota.

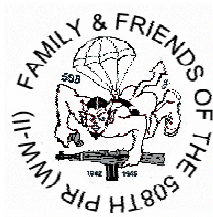
