The Defense Department is asking veterans who participated in atmospheric nuclear tests in 1945 to 1962, to contact them. This can be done by phoning toll free 800-336-3068 or writing the Defense Nuclear Agency, Washington, D.C. 20305

They believe the exposure was low but there is some disagreement in the scientific community as to the magnitude of the risk. If you believe your health has been affected, you are urged to consult your family doctor, or your nearest VA Hospital, where you will be examined at Government expense.
