1981 REUNION DAYTONA BEACH



Liege and Frankfurt are also included.

There is plenty of time allowed for visiting on this trip. Most meals are included.

At the business meeting, proposals were made to establish 508th Memorials in Arlington National Cemetery, Washington DC and in Beek, Holland.

As you remember, our main objective in Holland was to seize and hold the high ground. We did. Beek is on the flats at the foot of that high ground just outside of Nijmegen.

The Beek Memorial is a project the people of Beek will heartily support. They will match our funds and provide all of the administrative and organizational support. Their representative, Phillip Van Eltern and his son Servaas, attended this years convention. Phillip spoke to us about the memorial project. He is quietly confident and very interested in seeing the project through.

O.B. Hill is our liason with the city of Beek for the memorial. We expect it to be dedicated Sept. 17, 1981 during our tour of Europe.

The Arlington Memorial has been greatly aided by our own man on the spot Ray Costanzo, (I). Ray is the superintendent of the cemetery. It was reassuring to be talking to a buddy instead of a stranger when we started to investigate this idea. The Memorial will be in two parts. There will be a 508th Memorial Plaque to be displayed in the trophy room in the Memorial Amphitheater. The second part will be the planting of a clump of trees near the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. The planting will be memorialized with a stone and bronze marker.

The presentation and dedication of the memorial is done with a formal military ceremony which we can all attend. The project is scheduled for completion in the fall of 1982. This will be in sequence with our '82 convention at Fort Bragg.

Bob Chisolm (I) is our coordinator of the Arlington Memorial.

These two memorials with the ones in Normandy and Nottingham give us a total of four. Your past support has made the others possible. Your continued support will make Beek and Arlington successful.
