REGIMENTAL EXECUTIVE OFFICER: LT. COLONEL, WM. E. ECKMAN

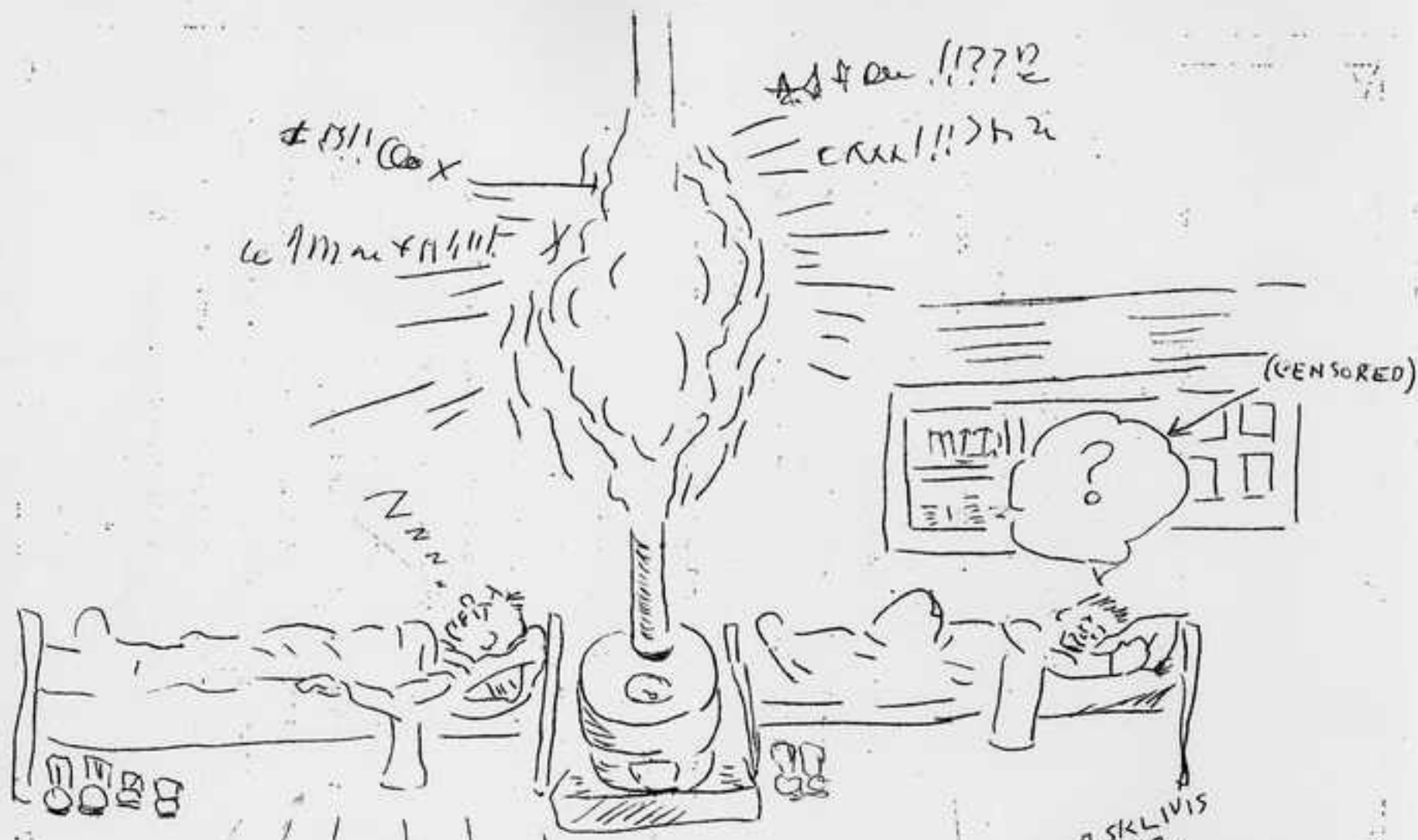
The first time we met our Colonel was at the Frying Pan in Fort Benning, Ga., his warm hand shake as he handed us our diploma and welcomed us into the 508th Parachute Infantry, made us more than anxious to get started. At first glance he impressed us of his very apparent military bearing, leadership ability, and understanding of men. Colonel Eckman was born in St. Louis, is married, and has two children.

He served as an enlisted man at Fort Benning, Ga. in the 29th Infantry from 1932 till 1933. He was a Private at Ft. Shaffner, Hawaii in the 64th Coast Artillery from '33 to '34. He attended West Point Prep School at Schofield Barracks. Our Colonel had an excellent record at West Point and graduated from there in 1938.

His career in the Paratroops started in July of 1941 when he became company B's commander of the 503rd. Later he helped to activate the 504th in the role of Adjutant. Before coming to our Regiment as Executive Officer he was the Adjutant at Headquarters of the Air - Borne Command.

The two favorite sports at which he excelled are football and the rugged game of La-Crosse. He has completed twelve jumps.

In him we find the contagious spirit that puts Paratroopers head and shoulders above the crowd.

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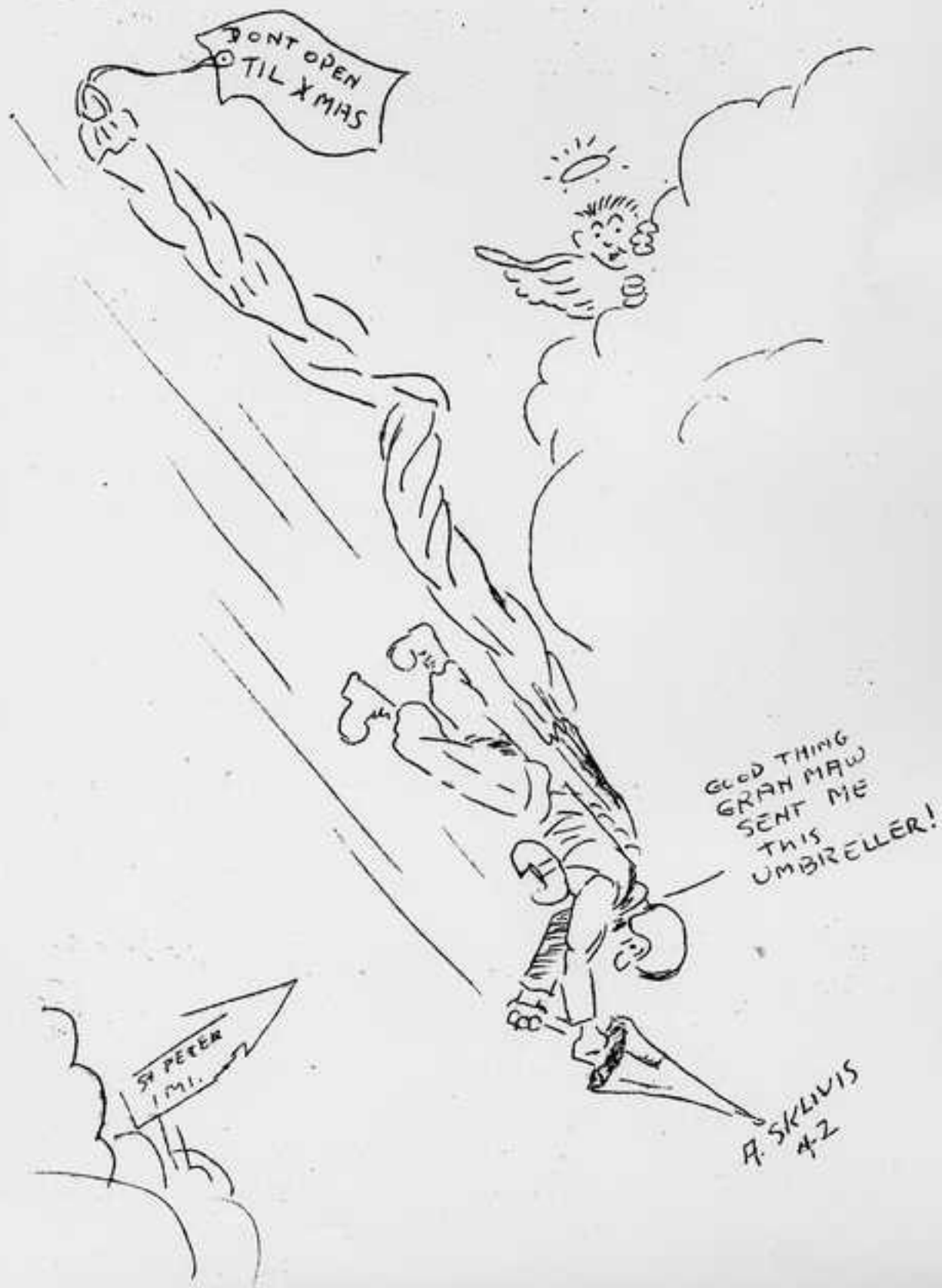
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BLOOPER
